Twin Cities JACL Afternoon at the Theater

On Sunday, June 11, a group of Twin Cities JACL members attended the final performance of Full Circle Theater's "365 Days, 365 Plays--A 2017 Remix" at Penumbra Theater in St. Paul. During the fast-paced two hour show, the production staged 46 of the 365 plays written by Pulitzer Prize and MacArthur "Genius" Award winning playwright Suzan-Lori Parks in her effort in 2003 to write a play a day for a year. A racially-mixed cast of ten professional actors and actresses tackled diversity and social justice themes using techniques such as humorous parody, theater-of-the absurd, and epic tragedy to express events in American history and current pressing social concerns.

Ruth Yahanda attended the play with Anna Murakami. She stated that: "We enjoyed the performance. We were simply amazed at how well the troupe performed --- not only in the multiple parts each of them played --- but also how well they moved the props around. They are talented."

A post-show discussion was held after each performance. Gordon Nakagawa led the post-show discussion after the June 11 performance. In his insights on the play, he explained:

"Suzan-Lori Parks used the phrase "radical inclusion" to describe how she allowed herself to be unreservedly open and receptive in her writing process. The phrase, "radical inclusion," also captures the spirit and performances of Full Circle Theater. Full Circle offers more than just superficial diversity and inclusion in their artists and performances. Full Circle embodies an experience of "radical inclusion" that takes us to and across the borders of difference and power, and reveals dramatically new, challenging, and transformative ways of thinking and feeling about ourselves, others, and our world. The show was a powerhouse, and the post-show discussion was incredibly dynamic and provocative."

Full Circle Theater was founded by artistic co-directors, Twin Cities JACL members, Rick Shiomi and Martha Johnson, and core artists, James A. Williams, Stephanie Lein Walseth, and Lara Trujillo. Its mission is to produce heartfelt groundbreaking theater that artfully addresses issues of diversity and social justice for 21st century audiences. Thank you to Full Circle Theater for providing the Twin Cities JACL with this opportunity to spend the afternoon captivated and entertained by a talented cast and crew.

Twin Cities JACL Co-Sponsors Exhibit, "Gambatte! Legacy of an Enduring Spirit: Japanese American WWII Incarceration, Then & Now"

In commemoration of the 75th anniversary of Executive Order 9066, the Twin Cities JACL is co-sponsoring with the Minnesota Historical Society, an exhibition titled, "Gambatte! Legacy of an Enduring Spirit: Japanese American WWII Incarceration, Then & Now."

Historic photographs of Japanese Americans during World War II taken by War Relocation Authority photographers, including Dorothea Lange and Tom Parker, are juxtaposed with contemporary portraits of the same individuals or their descendants taken by Pulitzer Prize-winning *Sacramento Bee* photographer Paul Kitagaki Jr.

An exhibit opening and reception was held at the Historic Fort Snelling Visitors Center on May 23, 2017. Kitagaki was the keynote speaker. He shared the story of how he came about the idea of this project, after learning that his grandfather, father, and aunt were photographed by Dorothea Lange while waiting for a bus in Oakland, CA in 1942, to take them to the assembly center after Executive Order 9066. He later visited the National Archives in Washington, DC, and viewed the original photographs, saved in shoebox-sized containers, with only the location and date that the photographs were taken written on the back.

As Kitagaki examined Lange's photographs, he realized that each has an untold story, and he began a quest in 2005 to search for the identities of the incarcerees photographed by War Relocation Authority photographers to share how their lives were changed by the incarceration order. To-date, he has identified and photographed over 50 of the original subjects or their direct descendants, and documented their life stories.

"This exhibition gives us a connection with real people rather than just an abstract historical event," stated Carolyn Nayematsu, co-chair of the Twin Cities JACL Education Committee. "The photographer spent over a decade creating this exhibit through extensive research, interviews and photography, and it is very moving and informative--a definite must-see for Japanese Americans and all others."

For the exhibition opening program, Twin Cities JACL Education Committee member, Dr. Gordon Nakagawa, served as the emcee. Melanie Adams, Senior Director, Guest Experience and Education Services for the Minnesota Historical Society, gave a welcome, and Tom Pfannenstiel, Site Manager at Historic Fort Snelling, provided introductory remarks.

The photographic exhibition and accompanying programs are being funded by the National Park Service, Tanforan Assembly Center Memorial Committee, Contra Costa JACL, Asian Pacific Endowment of the Saint Paul Foundation, Twin Cities JACL (including the Leslie and Karen Suzukamo, Donald S. Maeda, and Helen Tsuchiya funds), and the Joseph and Marie Winter Family Fund for Historic Fort Snelling.

"Gambatte!" is on display at the Historic Fort Snelling Visitors Center, 200 Tower Avenue, St. Paul, MN through Saturday, October 28, 2017, during Visitor Center hours, and is free and open to the public. Accompanying programs are being held in conjunction with the exhibition (see elsewhere in the Rice Paper for schedule).

Somekawa, Carl Kiyoshi 95, died of natural causes on April 11, 2017. The long-time owner of a Wayzata CPA firm, Carl lived at Meridian Manor with Mari, his cherished wife of 69 years. Carl grew up in an active family of 8 in Portland, OR. He was an avid sports fan and was known as a gifted athlete with a special love of baseball. When World War II erupted, Carl was a student at Oregon State College, where he played on the baseball team. Solely because of his Japanese heritage, he was ordered to Minidoka Internment Camp in 1942. In 1943 with the support of the Quakers, he was allowed to leave the Internment Camp to go to college. After a year in Boston, he moved to St. Paul to live with sister, Emi, and her husband, Howard Nomura, and graduated from the U of M with a BA in accounting. Carl had a great affinity for numbers. Any kind of numbers. He liked to add the numbers of passing license plates and identify number patterns he encountered while shopping. (His love of numbers also enhanced his skill with a deck of cards.) As a frugal student with limited means, Carl courted Mari. In family lore, "Streetcar Carl" succeeded in charming Mari and won her heart over another suitor she called "Taxicab Bob." Carl and Mari were married in 1947. Carl was grateful to Ray Plank, the only person willing to give Carl a job following World War II in the face of widespread bias against Japanese Americans. Plank also pointed Carl and Mari to Ridgeview Drive. Here they built a home, made lifelong friends, and saw their children flourish. His family greatly appreciates the care and attention paid to Carl by the superb staff of Meridian Manor. In addition to his wife Mari, he is survived by sister Aida Kozu, son Roger Somekawa (Dianne), daughter Ellen Somekawa (Eric Joselyn), and grandchildren Kevin Somekawa, Tai Joselyn and Chi Pham. The family celebrated Carl's life at a private reception held in lieu of a formal service. Memorials to Asian Americans United (1023 Callowhill Street, Philadelphia, PA 19123) in Carl's name are welcomed.
