Submission 1: LNY Tiger

This illustration was done in celebration of the Tết (Lunar New Year) in 2022. The tiger is surrounded by a border of oranges and hoa mai (apricot flowers). Oranges are typically gifted and eaten during LNY. For many Asian families, freshly cut fruit can be seen as a symbol of love and care in place of words. Hoa mai is a Vietnamese flower typically seen during the LNY season. These beautiful yellow florals are said to spread luck and wealth in the new year.
