President's Message

This summer was a whirlwind for the Twin Cities JACL. Here's a recap of our chapter's events and activities these past months (more details and photos inside).

June: Allison Fenimore and Jamie Cork represented our chapter as delegates at the National Convention in Las Vegas. Jamie also served on the Resolutions Committee and Ben Ezaki, our MDC governor, served on the Program for Action Committee. One of our chapter members and past presidents, David Hayashi, was elected National JACL V.P. of Planning and Development (congratulations, David!). Leilani Savitt and Natalie Nakasone, two of our chapter youth reps (also serving as MDC district youth co-reps), attended the convention and had the opportunity to meet JACL youth from ound the country. Jacquie Lehman helped at the convention as an intern.

The TC JACL was a co-sponsor of the annual Super Senior luncheon, a fun gathering of over-75ers and a few of us younger ones, too! Program organizer Sam Honda presented Morris Lundeen with a plaque to acknowledge his work in editing "A History of the Minnesota Nikkei Project - the First Twenty Years," which has already sold out its first printing. The book is full of precious memories that serve to educate, enlighten and inspire the Sansei and future generations.

Our first craft class was on making Japanese doll cards and bookmarks. Taught by Lil Honda and coordinated by chairperson Kathy Ohama Koch, the Sansei and Yonsei participants caught on fast to create their own original pieces from Lil's samples.

July: Gloria Kumagai and I attended a luncheon sponsored by our State Council on Asian-Pacific Jinnesotans to thank Asian Pacific American Heritage Month banquet sponsors and to begin planning for next year's celebration. One of the State Council's goals is to make the broader community more aware that the month of May is Asian Pacific Heritage Month throughout the United States, and is proclaimed so every year by our country's President.

The annual summer picnic was a huge success, with lots of food, games, fun, and sun. The amendments and corrections to our chapter's by-laws and Constitution were approved unanimously by the general membership (thank you to the By-Laws Committee headed by Carolyn Sandberg!).

The Twin Cities JACL was a co-sponsor of the National Asian Pacific American Women's Forum (NAPAWF) program titled, "Pan-Asian Women's Economic Justice Forum," hosted by the Minnesota chapter as part of their national board's semi-annual meeting. Gloria Kumagai, Leilani Savitt and I had the opportunity to meet many energetic Asian Pacific American women leaders from our state and around the country who are involved in women's advocacy and activism.

Our youth reps have been planning activities to get chapter and district youth acquainted. Jessica Lehman, Mariko and Natalie Nakasone, and Leilani Savitt organized a bowling activity in July for our chapter's youth at the "retro" Jillian's Lanes at the Mall of America. In August, they planned a trip for MDC youth to get together and enjoy themselves at Six Flags in Gurnee, Illinois, while sneaking in some education about the Japanese American incarceration during WWII. Leilani and Natalie will be attending a National JACL youth leadership conference in mid-September.

August: I attended a meeting organized by the Council on Asian-Pacific Minnesotans to discuss higher education issues in Minnesota with Dr. Roy Saigo, President of St. Cloud State University (and one of our JACL members) and other Asian-Pacific American leaders. Among the issues addressed was

the disproportionately low number of Asian-Pacific Americans in top higher education positions as administrators and educators.

Friends and several members of the Twin Cities JACL organized a "Taiko Jam" to raise funds for the family of Phil Sudo. In addition to local community members, many of the Sudo/Ohno family from around the country attended the awesome and inspiring concert performed by Twin Cities Japanese American drum group Kogen Taiko.

We had a bazaar booth for the first time at the Japanese Lantern Lighting and Obon Festival at Como Park in St. Paul. Bookmarks made by the youth group at Carolyn Sandberg's house were sold at the booth, along with our other usual "Festival" items.

The Minnesota Twins hosted the first "Asian American Heritage Night" at the Metrodome, and I ran into several Twin Cities JACL members at the concession stands. Sansei Yonsei Kai danced during the pre-game show, and the Twins played Ichiro Suzuki and the Mariners (final score: Twins 2, Seattle 1). The best parts for my son were the treats, meeting Twins mascot "TC," and having me buy him a Twins baseball cap (he didn't much care that we missed the two homeruns while in line for snacks and the cap, but we did see the "Painting by Nakasone" Twins-O-Gram on the big screen).

I attended a forum on "Post 9/11 America, Voices from AHANA (African, Hispanic, Asian and Native American) and Muslim Communities in Minnesota," that was a followup to last year's forum following 9/11. As we commemorate the first anniversary of the September 11 tragedy and remember the victims, their families, the rescue and recovery workers and others, be assured that National JACL and your local chapter are continuing to monitor for violations of civil and human rights in the community and in government policies, so that injustices based on race, religion, ethnicity, country of origin, or otherwise will not be permitted or tolerated.

Other news: Leilani Savitt, who just started her freshman year at the U of Wisconsin at Madison, received National JACL's Gongoro Nakamura Scholarship award. She has served as a chapter youth

rep for two terms, and is continuing as MDC Youth Co-Rep. Congratulations and best wishes!

Thanks to Connie Fukuda, the Twin Cities JACL received a \$600 American Express grant to support the Camp Savage 60th Anniversary commemoration program and screening of "Uncommon Courage: Patriotism and Civil Liberties" that took place at the Minnesota History Center in June.

**Upcoming Events:** Allison Fenimore will represent our chapter at the Fall MDC meeting, hosted by the Hoosier chapter. We are also grateful to Allison for sharing her expertise and getting our chapter's website up and running.

Watch for the mailing of our annual report and slate in early October. Because of our special Chrysan-themum banquet program on Saturday, Nov. 9 featuring NASA astronaut Daniel Tani, the Twin Cities JACL annual meeting and installation of board members will be held on Tuesday, October 15 (dinner beginning at 6 p.m. followed by annual business meeting and installation); location to be announced.

### ABOUT DANIEL TANI

Tani, 40, who holds bachelor's and master's degrees in mechanical engineering from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, was selected as an astronaut in April 1996 after working for 10 years for space-related companies, primarily with Orbital Sciences Corp. There, assignments included a period as launch operations manager of the Pegasus program.

Aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavour in December 2001, the 12<sup>th</sup> shuttle flight to visit the International Space Station, Tani served as mission specialist 2 and performed the flight's four-hour space walk with Linda Godwin. During the 11-day mission, he served as Endeavour's flight engineer during ascent and entry, and had primary responsibility in post-insertion activities, converting the shuttle from a launch vehicle to an orbiting spacecraft. He provided information to the commander and pilot during rendezvous with the station and after undocking, and was responsible for shuttle laptop and payload support computers. He also had primary responsibility for deploying the Starshine 2 satellite. The mission was accomplished in 185 Earth orbits, traveling 4.8 million miles in nearly 284 hours.

His previous NASA experience includes technical duties in the Astronaut Office Computer Support Branch and the EVA (Extravehicular Activity) Branch. He served as Crew Support Astronaut for Expedition-2.

Tani is currently assigned as the Expedition-9 backup flight engineer.




JACL sponsored a booth at the Obon Festival at Como Park on August 18. It was a beautiful and successful day, with a record sale (roughly \$500). The booth included


had not heard before in a very informal and question engaging environment.

## NATIONAL JACL BIENNIUM CONVENTION - Las Vegas, Nevada

Il another two years has quickly gone by and another national convention is over. The national convention was held at the Riviera Hotel and Conference Center in a <u>very hot</u> Las Vegas, Nevada, June 26 to June 30, 2002. Several members from the Twin Cities Chapter attended the convention, Jamie Ishio Cork and Allison Fenimore attended as the chapter's delegates, Ben Ezaki attended as the Midwest District Governor, Leilani Savitt and Natalie Nakasone attended as Midwest District Youth Reps and Jacqueline Ishio-Lehman attended as an intern.

The convention was busy but fun. The event kicked off with a welcome reception including a dinner and entertainment, which of course had to include an Elvis impersonator. There were two days of business meetings with one day of various workshops in between. The grand finale of the event was the silent auction and Sayonara Banquet, with keynote speaker, Morris Dees, Director of the Southern Poverty Law Center.

During the business meetings each of the national officers gave a report of the state of affairs regarding their offices. This was followed by the proposal of resolutions, constitution and bylaw amendments and budget discussions. The National Council approved the resolutions to ask the Boy Scouts of America to reconsider their stance on gay troop leaders, the resolution relating to religious freedom, and the resolution to support the Eagledale Ferry Landing National Monument and the Council did not reject any resolution. After lengthy discussions the National Council ratified the constitution and bylaws amendments to disolve the Mountain Plains District Council and add a National Youth/Student Chairperson. Therefore the youth would not lose a vote due to the dissolution of MPDC. It appears that MPDC will become part of MDC making MDC the largest district geographically. Also ratified were amendments to include annual reports to be distributed to the district governors and the establishment of standing committees by the National Council and did not ratify the constitution and bylaws amendments to restructure the tional Board nor to add a set amount of money that would go to the youth out of membership dues. The budget the next biennium was passed and included a large increase to the youth budget.

The election of national officers was also held during the convention. Ron Katsuyama from Dayton, Ohio in our district was running for Vice President of Membership so it was exciting to assist him in his election campaign. Unfortunately, after a gallant attempt Ron was not elected to national office. The following people are the new JACL National Officers:Floyd Mori, President, Art Koga, Secretary/Treasurer, Ryan Chin, VP of Membership, David Kawamoto, VP of General Operations, Ken Innouye, VP of Public Affairs, David Hiyashi, VP of Planning and Development, Joshua Spry, National Youth Representative, Maya Yamazaki, National Youth Chairperson.

Several of the workshops focused on assisting the Nisei and many of the concerns facing them as they age. There was also a leadership workshop, which was directed primarily at the youth in the first session and the delegates in the second session. And our own Bill Yoshino presented a workshop on hate crime prevention in communities. It was a day filled with valuable information to assist the JA community.

The youth luncheon was a great success with RJ Reynolds' grandson as the keynote speaker. He did a very charismatic presentation about the negatives of smoking. The dinner to honor the veterans was a success even though Norman Mineta, the keynote speaker, did not attend Floyd Mori stepped up and filled the evening with his comments.

And of course the city of lights was filled with entertainment for everyone. The continuous glitter was overwhelming. Just a look at each of the hotels and casinos is an amazing tour. 
