January - The board started the new year with its 5th annual half-day retreat. The board reviewed the current operational structure, and revised it by categorized activities and committees into four areas: Programs, Fundraising, Finance, and Administrative.

The board also focused on creating an operational plan for the year (thanks to Jan Monson for creating the visual aids). For each of our programs and activities, the board reviewed a summary of the good and negative points from 2002, with any suggestions from the committee or program chair, and came up with a well-defined plan for 2003 (who, what, timelines and resources needed). We hope that this will improve the efficiency of the board, and enable us to serve the membership and community more effectively.

Regarding membership, we extend a thank you to Gloria Kumagai, for serving as membership chair for the past 3 years. Rachel Matsumoto is taking over as membership chair and is putting together a membership committee. Let her know if you are interested in helping out.

Other things we have been involved in this first month of 2003 are as follows. Allison Fenimore represented our chapter at the MDC Education Committee meeting at the MDC Chicago office. Allison has also worked hard to get our website up and going; take a look at www.tcjacl.org.

We sent a letter to Parasole Restaurant Holdings, Inc., owner of the restaurant Chino Latino as a community response to a billboard ad, "Our happy hour is cheaper than a Bangkok brothel."






Dedication of the Lealtad-Suzuki Center at Macalester College



"Meet the Astronaut" Children's Program

JACL members and corporate sponsors and their children got a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to meet a real, live NASA astronaut. Daniel Tani appeared in his blue space suit for an hour-long afternoon children's program, and enthralled a crowd of more than 60 adults and children. After showing the video of his space shuttle trip to the International Space Station, he took lots of time to answer questions by inquisitive children (and adults). With humor and insight, he talked about how astronauts eat, sleep, shower and exercise in space, and what they do on the shuttle and at the space station.

Later, he autographed photos and took Polaroids pictures with the children. Maybe the event would inspire one of the attendees to become an astronaut someday?

In December, the Twin Cities JACL co-sponsored, along with the Hennepin County Libraries and the Japan America Society of Minnesota, a private **reception for Frank Wu**, author of "Yellow: Race in America Beyond Black and White," and co-author of the textbook "Race, Rights and Reparation: Law and the Japanese American Internment." Wu is the first Asian American law professor to be tenured at Howard University.




"...if I didn't speak for other Asian Americans, then others would assume that we didn't have anything to contribute. People would say, 'where were you?" Articulately spoken with humor, at the public "Emerging Voices" program Wu talked about his experiences, including those not uncommon to other Asian Americans. He discussed the "Model Minority" myth, defined by the oversimplified statement, "You Asians are all doing well," and how each attractive stereotypical trait can be turned around. To be "polite" is to know one's place, to be "good in math and science" is to lack interpersonal skills and leadership potential, to be "hardworking" means that others cannot compete.

The other stereotype Wu discussed is the "Perpetual Foreigner" syndrome, denoted by questions and remarks such as, "Where are you really from?" "How long have you been in this country?" "You speak English so well." He described how this syndrome can also work against Asian Americans by depriving them of their civil rights and transforming the group into a racial threat, as exemplied by the internment and more recently the 1996 campaign finance scandal.

In addition to these challenges for Asian Americans, he discussed issues in relating with other communities of color. In his conclusion, he asserted, "I'd like to propose that it's never done.... Diversity is like democracy. Democracy is a process, and the idea is to participate." He gave some practical suggestions for civil rights activists: to ask what would be best for society as a whole, that rather than taking sides on the basis of race, be on the side that's right. Wu's hope is for us to be open-minded and to build bridges and reform coalitions in order to achieve racial justice.

I was grateful that the presentation, discussion, and book put words to some of my own feelings, experiences, and observations about race relations. I think others also left enlightened and inspired to continue educational programs and advocacy work in the broader community.
