PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: It's hard to believe that the school year is already over. Looking to summer, I'm sure you all have many activities planned, but I hope to see you at one or more of our upcoming JACL activities.

Below is a brief summary of the highlights from the past four months:

#### February

The Immortal Chaplains Foundation presented Tom Oye, veteran of the 100th/442nd Regimental Combat Team, with "The 2003 Prize for Humanity," representing the combat service volunteers of WWII.

Our chapter was a co-sponsor of a community briefing with Lora Jo Foo, author of "Asian American Women: Issues, Concerns, and Responsive Human and Civil Rights Advocacy." We presented Ms. Foo with a copy of our 50th Anniversary Cookbook.

Members of our chapter wrote letters to the media and to legislators to express concern about North Carolina Rep. Howard Coble's endorsement of FDR's decision to incarcerate the Japanese American community during WWII as being necessary for their safety and that of the country (see letter by Albert Tsuchiya). National JACL and others are calling for his resignation or removal as chair of the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism and Homeland Security.

#### March

The chapter's education committee had an exhibit table at the Minnesota annual social studies teacher's conference, and distributed resources information about the WWII Japanese American experience. Thanks to Sally Sudo, Jan Monson, Mikio and Lucy Kirihara, Lil Grothe, Sylvia Farrells for setting up and manning the booth, and to Jay and Debbie Kirihara for volunteering their time to create another display for our chapter..

Allison Fenimore represented our chapter at the MDC Spring meeting in Cleveland and met with the MDC Education Committee.

We made phone calls, sent letters, and joined other Asian American groups in a broad-based community protest against Chino Latino restaurant's billboard that boasted, "Happy Hour: Cheaper than a Bangkok Brothel." (A smaller scale community reaction three years ago was prompted by their ad, "As exotic as food gets without using dog.") The PC and Asian American Press carried articles that expressed our concerns about advertising themes that perpetuate negative

stereotypes of Asians/Asian Americans and other communities of color. The billboard was removed, and an apology was printed in the Star Tribune, but to date, we have not received a response to the two letters we sent to Phil Roberts, CEO of Parasole Restaurant Holdings, Inc. We also requested that other restaurants under Parasole's ownership or management (Figlio, Good Earth, Manny's, Muffaletta, Oceanaire, Buca di Beppo) refrain from employing derogatory ethnic humor in their advertisements.

I attended the five-day JACL/OCA Leadership Conference in Washington D.C. thanks to the generous funding of the chapter (see report).

#### April

We sent a letter to our legislators requesting that proposed budget cuts be reinstated to the Council on Asian-Pacific Minnesotans (CAPM) and the other councils of color. CAPM represents our state's 40+ Asian Pacific American (APA) groups, and serves as a vital link between the APA community and the Governor and legislature. Years ago, the Minnesota legislature created the four councils of color, and to my knowledge, Minnesota is the only state with these distinct state-funded minority councils.

We also sent letters to Fuji Ya Japanese Restaurant expressing concerns about recent billboard and print ads that we feel promote negative stereotypes about Asians/Asian Americans and Asian/Asian American women. The ads feature a photograph of a Japanese woman, Japanese writing in the background, and a "translation" of the writing with pitches such as, "Your regularity is our pleasure;" "Enjoyment of you is extreme priority;" and "The taste of flavor is exceptionally obvious." Fuji Ya owner Thomas Hanson responded by saying that he apologizes if he offended members of our organization, and he graciously offered us the opportunity to give input into future ad campaigns. After our initial letter, the following ads appeared: "Eating us will bring smile;" and "From this position you will receive fun." While we support Asian/Asian American businesses, we felt it important to speak out when ads "push the envelope." If you have any concerns about the ads or our response, please contact me or another board member.

#### May

This year's Festival of Nations was our "most successful fundraiser ever" (we have been able to say that for the past several years), thanks to Chuck Tatsuda, Cary and Peggy Yamanaka, Joyce Miyamoto, Sam and Lil Honda, Gloria Kumagai, Linda van Dooijeweert, Kelvin and Annette Lee, John Nakasone, and the many, many volunteers it takes to prepare and man the demonstration and bazaar booths.

The Honda, Noonan, Yonekawa and Dulas children spent a fun afternoon in the Nakasone's backyard.

The rain did not deter a crowd of about 40 from attending the Japanese American Veterans of Minnesota (JAVM) memorial service at Fort Snelling National Cemetery and decorating grave sites. Thank you to JAVM officers, Bud Nakasone, Sam Honda, Kathy Ohama Koch and others for organizing the program, and to Chaplain (Major) Kenneth Beale for his mediations and benediction.

Several JACL members attended the second annual Asian American Night at the Dome, Twins vs. Mariners. Seasonticketholder, John Nakasone, had a "Painting by Nakasone" Twins-O-Gram again this year. Also, congratulations to John, Jacqueline and family on the 25th anniversary of "Painting by Nakasone"!

Our chapter's financial health is very sound thanks to our investment committee, Steve Kumagai and Fred Tsuchiya, and treasurer Lisa Hintermeister. The education committee (Sally Sudo, chair) continues to provide speakers and resources, and our membership (Rachel Matsumoto, chair) is on the upswing. 
#### Upcoming in June/July

AS YOU ALL KNOW, WE OWE TOM AND ALL OF OUR NISEI VETS A TREMENDOUS DEBT OF GRATITUDE FOR RISKING THEIR LIVES AND MAKING US PROUD TO BE AMERICANS OF JAPANESE DESCENT!

IN THAT SAME ISSUE OF ASIAN AMERICAN PRESS, PRESIDENT DULAS CRITICIZED "CHINO-LATINO RESTAURANT" FOR THEIR RECENT RACIST BILLBOARDS THAT CLAIM THEIR HAPPY HOUR IS "CHEAPER THAN A BANGKOK BROTHEL". DULAS PUT THE RESTAURANT ON NOTICE THAT "THE USE OF DEROGATORY, DEMEANING AND DISTASTEFUL TACTICS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED BY OUR COMMUNITY." 

In the early 70's, Takamoto's talents were again put on the big screen when he directed the animation of the award winning theatrical release of "Charlotte's Web". Takamoto, is a recipient of the Windsor McKay's Lifetime Achievement Award for his animated work. He is currently Vice President of Creative Design at Warner Bros. Animation (formally known as Hanna Barbera Studio) and is still active in the animation field today.

Interesting Facts about Cancer from "Asian American Women: Issues, Concerns, and Responsive Human and Civil Rights Advocacy" by Lora Jo Foo

Few studies on health in Asian American women have been carried out, and even less data is available on subgroups; however, it is established that significant health disparities exist between Asian American women and the general population for preventable and treatable illnesses.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of death in Asian Pacific American (APA) women aged 45 to 54, but it occurs at varying rates for different Asian ethnicities. Among APA women, those of Japanese ancestry have the highest breast cancer incidence, followed by Filipinas. Breast cancer is also the most common cancer among Chinese and Korean women.

Breast cancer death rates for white, African American, and Latino women decreased or stayed the same from 1990-95, but the incidence of breast cancer for APA women increased during that period. Furthermore, APA women are at risk for cancer at younger ages and of more aggressive types than non-Asian women, and the risk of death is 1.5 to 1.7 times that of white women.








# RICE PAPER reflections

#### Reflections on the 2003 JACL/OCA Leadership Conference, Submitted by Cheryl Hirata-Dulas



Being a part of the JACL/OCA Washington DC Leadership Conference was an intense and inspiring experience. I had the opportunity to work with 29 other people from around the country, all of them articulate, dedicated, and bright. When it ended, I left motivated and filled with ideas, yet sad that I had to say goodbye to the colleagues with whom I had spent the past five jam-packed days.

I was very impressed with the level of commitment and dedication that our organizers, Kristine Minami (JACL Washington DC rep), Christine Chen (OCA Executive Director), and Keith McAllister (OCA Director of Technology), put into making this conference a valuable experience for us. Their depth of knowledge and strength of their relationships with others was amazing. The schedule of speakers they assembled was also quite remarkable.

#### Conference highlights included:

- meeting Senator Daniel Inouye, Representative Mike Honda, and other APA officials and activists serving their local communities, and hearing their stories about how and why they choose to serve,
- getting immersed in learning about the most pressing issues affecting the APA community, including the Patriot II act, immigration, affirmative action, and the Coble issue,
- gaining information on strategies and approaches to: lobbying for non-profit organizations, working more effectively with Senators and Representatives, building coalitions on the local level, handling the media and interviews, and running for local appointed positions or elected offices,
- attending a White House briefing with John Quoc Dong, from the White House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, and hearing his perspective on the issues we learned about during our conference sessions, and
- getting a personalized tour of the Japanese American Memorial by Warren Minami, Kristine's father and chair of the National Japanese American Memorial Foundation.

I took away several important lessons from the conference. First, I learned that developing relationships and building coalitions with other groups is key to getting things accomplished. The conference has opened doors for collaborative efforts with our local OCA chapter, and I hope to be able to strengthen relationships with other APA groups in my area. Secondly, it was eye-opening to hear different perspectives and positions on the same issue, such as immigration and national security, and how easy it is for the general public to take an opposing view depending on how the issue is presented. Lastly, I realized how important it is that the APA community be vigilant and attentive, be integrally involved with creating public policy, and be vocal in speaking out against injustice. We are fortunate to have APA elected and appointed officials and JACL and OCA representatives in Washington D.C. to keep us informed about the issues, but activism from the broader community is essential.

Letter submitted to the Star Tribune and St. Paul Pioneer Press by Al Tsuchiya:

I have recently been made aware of racist remarks made by Rep. Coble of NC. His remarks on a radio talk program were prejudicial, fictitious and crowd inciting. Either he is uninformed, not concerned with facts or has blind allegiance to his own biased opinion or all of the above.

His constituents are among highly opinionated in the country and any high profile figure normally would be careful in choosing his words but I strongly suspect his motive in this instance.

His remarks/opinions regarding Arab Americans and particularly Japanese Americans open a wound that took 50 years to heal. He violated the unwritten code to not use minorities as political fodder.

I was one of 120,000 Japanese Americans on the West Coast subjected to mass hysteria following Pearl Harbor. We were victims of President Roosevelt's hatred of the Japanese people (his remarks in 1925, 1936 and the 40's plus his signing executive order 9066 that gave him authority to place all people of Japanese ancestry in concentration camps can be traced to his hatred.) References can be provided.

President Roosevelt did nothing to discourage the hate headlines published by the Los Angeles Times, San Francisco Examiner and McClatchy Bee groups. In addition well known journalists, newscasters and governors of western states picked up on this hysteria. Rep. Coble can't be naive when he makes racist and reckless remarks. He can easily cause crowd and mob reaction that can lead to violence.

I write this to ask your newspaper to renounce Rep. Coble's irresponsible remarks. In today's tension filled political and economic times, we don't need gas-on-flame politicians like Rep. Coble.

The Asian American Journalists Association congratulated KSTP-TV in Minneapolis today for choosing a Japanese-American man to anchor its 5 p.m, 6 p.m. and 10 p.m. newscasts. The hiring of Kent Ninomiya, 36, for KSTP's main weekday newscast is an important step, given the paucity of Asian-American males in broadcasting, and the even smaller number who occupy the anchor desk. A recent AAJA study conducted by the Annenberg School for Communication at the University of Southern California found that in the top 25 markets there are only 19 Asian-

American males on the air in television news. Minneapolis is the 14th largest market in the country.

Kent comes to Channel 5 from KCOP in Los Angeles where he has served as weekend anchor since 2001. Prior to KCOP, he served as weekday morning anchor at KGO in San Franciso. Kent spent five years in the midwest reporting on the streets for news powerhouse WLS in Chicago. His reporting/news career also includes positions at KGTV in San Diego; KFSN and KJEO in Fresno, California; KIEM, Eureka, California; WGGB, Springfield, Massachusetts; and the Washington, D.C. bureau of CNN.

He is a graduate of the University of California in Berkeley where he studied history, political science, and mass communications. Kent is a native of California and grew up in San Diego.
