"Only the Brave"

The principal filming has been completed for a featurelength film about the 100th/442nd RCT, told from a Japanese American perspective and geared to a broad audience. Titled, "Only the Brave," the film follows the Nisei soldiers' exploits throughout Europe, centering on the rescue of the Texas Lost Battallion in the Vosges Forest, France, in 1944.

Eric Hayashi, the film's co-Executive Producer, is cousin of TC JACL member Penelope Haru Snipper (see photo). He came to the Twin Cities from Northern California to attend our "Remembrances: Voices of the Internment" community forum, and shared a few words about the film and fundraising efforts. Major funding was provided by private donations, the National Japanese American Historical Society, and California Civil Liberties Public Education Fund. DreamWorks provided free use of a backlot. "Only the Brave" is directed by Lane Nishikawa for Mission from Buddha Productions. We will be watching for the release date of this powerful film.

RICE PAPER education committee



The Education Committee manned a table at the Minnesota Council for the Social Studies Spring Conference at the Thunderbird Hotel in March. Sylvia Farrells, Lucy Kirihara and Lil answered questions, and distributed

The Minnesota State legislature approved a revised version of the State Education Commission's social studies academic standards at the end of the last session. The standards are slated to go into effect statewide in the 2005/6 school year. See www.house.leg.state.mn.us/fiscal/files/ssstand.pdf to review the history and social studies standards. Our education committee had been tracking the standards to ensure that aspects of the Japanese American experience were included. Recall that the original version did not include "internment", and Sally Sudo and others testified at public hearings, wrote letters to the Commission, and letters to the editor.

In the approved version, the Japanese American experience is included in the following:

- US History, Grades 4-8 Benchmark: "Students will evaluate the impact of WWII on the home front and on American culture, including the Japanese internment...." (p. 7).
- US History, Grades 9-12 Benchmark: "Students will describe the impact of the war (WWII) on women, African Americans and Japanese Americans." "Japanese internment" is cited as an example (p. 18).
- Minnesota History, Grades 4-8 Benchmark: "Students will describe Minnesota's contribution to WWII and analyze the impact of the war on Minnesota." "Fort Snelling language school" is cited as an example (p. 23).
- Government and Citizenship, Grades 9-12 Benchmark: "Students will compare the rights and responsibilities of U.S. citizens with the rights and responsibilities of non-citizens in the U.S., and describe changes in citizenship since 1870." "Executive Order 9066" is cited as an example (p. 70).



RICE PAPER community forum

Panel moderator Kent Ninomiya, and panelists Yo Matsumoto, Yoshi Tani, Seiki Oshiro, Lucy Kirihara, and Sally Sudo.

Remembering: Voices of the Internment" Community Forum KSTP-TV's Kent Ninomiya, the first Asian American male prime time newsanchor in a major metropolitan market, moderated our chapter's community forum on February 28 at the Bloomington Civic Plaza auditorium. Titled "Remembering: Voices of the Internment," the program coincided with Day of Remembrance observances throughout the country. Over 160 attended the program, including area residents, students, teachers, and reporters. Education committee chair, Sally Sudo, gave a historical overview of events leading to Executive Order 9066, Ninomiya talked about his family's



internment experiences, then four local Nisei shared their personal stories. Lucy Kirihara spoke about her experiences as a 6-8th grader at Minidoka, Seiki Oshiro shared his perspective as a Japanese American living in Hawaii, Yoshi Tani discussed her thoughts as a college student whose education was interrupted by the internment, and Yo Matsumoto described his internment and WWII military experiences.


An audience Q/A session brought out several inquiries about current events, including the aftermath of Sept. 11, the film "Pearl Harbor," and the role of the chapter in revising the Minnesota social studies academic standards. The results of a Nov. 2003 survey about internment experiences in the Minnesota Japanese American community were compiled in a booklet and display. A 1-hr edited version of the forum will be aired on St. Paul cable access on "East Meets West," a weekly program of Asian Media Access.

The forum was dedicated to the memory of Tom Ohno, past chapter president and an active participant in the TC JACL speakers bureau and scholarship committee. Funding was provided by the Twin Cities JACL, along with grants from the American Express Foundation (\$400) and the Archie D. and Bertha H. Walker Foundation (\$1,000).

The Anguish of Surrender: Japanese POWs of World War II

The Japan America Society of Minnesota and the Japanese American Citizens League will present an author talk with Rick Straus, hosted by Historic Fort Snelling. Mr. Straus is a retired Foreign Service officer who has written a book entitled "The Anguish of Surrender: Japanese POWs of World War II," published by the University of Washington Press. His book details the experiences of Japanese soldiers and sailors who became prisoners of war in spite of their orders to choose death before surrender, and is based on historical documents and extensive interviews with former Japanese POWs and the American soldiers who dealt with them.

Mr. Straus grew up in Japan, and after studying at the Military Intelligence Service Language School (MISLS) at Fort Snelling, served as a Japanese Language Officer at General Headquarters in Japan. Over half of his foreign service career was devoted to the U.S.-Japan relationship. Currently he is retired and lives with his wife in Michigan.

KEEP IT GOING...PASS IT ON 35th Annual Manzanar Pilgrimage April 24, 2004

Gambatte! Shikata ga nai! Words heard during the opening ceremony for the grand opening of the Manzanar Interpretive Center, Manzanar National Historic Site, Owens Valley, CA.

A beautiful day -- light wind, sunny, snow covered mountain backdrop, and over 1000 people in attendance. Welcoming and Interfaith Memorial Service was held in the morning followed by the Grand Opening Ceremony of the interpretive center located in the restored camp auditorium in the afternoon.

There several camp internees who were very willing to speak about their experiences to journalists, TV camera crews, and anyone listening. The 813 acres are still intact and some concrete platforms where the ironing room, latrines, and utility rooms were located are visible and marked. Also, visible are the remains of two Japanese gardens and several grave markers in the cemetery. A mess hall building, recently moved to the site, is in need for restoration as are the gardens. The National Park Service and the Manzanar Committee are searching for original buildings that can be acquired and move to the campsite.

Distinguished speakers included Frank Hays, Superintendent, Manzanar National Historic Site; Sue Kunitomi Embrey, Chair, Manzanar Committee; Rose Ochi, Former Assistant Deputy Attorney General, U. S. Department of Justice; Tom LaBonge, LA City Council Member; and Fran Mainella, Director, National Park Service. Also attending were representatives of Senator D. Feinstein (D-CA) and the Consul General of Japan, Los Angeles, CA.

TC JACL Credit Union to merge with National

After 51 years of serving the local Japanese American community, the Twin Cities JACL Credit Union (TC JACL CU) is proceeding with plans to merge with the National JACL Credit Union, based in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Acting on a recommendation by the TC JACL CU board of directors, members present at the organization's 51st annual membership dinner in February voted unanimously in favor of the merger, tentatively planned for completion by June 30, 2004.

At the dinner, president Roy Kyono and treasurer Edward Yoshikawa explained how the TC JACL CU has evolved. In the late 1940s and early '50s, many Japanese Americans relocated to the Twin Cities area, but had no credit references, which created difficulties in obtaining financing from established banks. A credit union was an ideal organization to help with funding. Over the next 50 years of operation, the Nisei and Sansei have assimilated into their communities – churches, jobs, neighborhoods – and now have access to any and all financing organizations. With this, the TC JACL CU's usefulness to the community has diminished. In addition, the TC JACL CU has been faced with the challenge of converting its books to computer and with finding additional board members (many of the current board members have served for more than 25 years!).

Interestingly, the U.S. Patriot Act has meant that the treasurer must now review dozens of pages of faxes received regularly from the federal government containing names of persons with questionable character; this is a large task for a small organization.

Terrell Nagata, president/manager of the National JACL Credit Union (National), attended the annual dinner to outline the services provided by National and how a merger might affect TC JACL CU members. National is celebrating its 61st year with assets of \$28 million. In addition to regular savings and loans, National's services include VISA Platinum cards, debit cards, IRAs (traditional, Roth and education), money market savings, traveler's checks, car loans processed within 24 hours, and a Web site (www. jaclcu.com). Members have Internet access to their account, as well as access to a 24-hour phone teller, a toll-free 800 number, and in the near future, a network of outlets housed in other credit unions locally for convenient in-person transactions. JACL members in any chapter are eligible for services provided by the National credit union. Within in the last few years, JACL credit unions in Chicago and San Francisco have also merged with National.

Current TC JACL CU members will experience slight changes as a result of the merger, including quarterly payment of dividends rather than yearly and new minimum share requirements for life insurance coverage. Under consideration is the continuation of the popular annual TC JACL CU membership dinners!

Many Twin Cities JACL members have served on the local credit union board of directors and many, many have used the services of the TC JACL CU. We are grateful that this organization was established years ago when it was so crucial to the community and that the outstanding service and personal connections within the community have been maintained for the past 51 years.
