

LOUIS PARK AND EATING JAPANESE FOOD AT THE PICNIC. I WANTED THEM TO SEE THE VALUE IN **VOLUNTEERING AND HELPING OTHERS** BECAUSE IT ENRICHES OUR OWN LIVES SO GREATLY.

SECONDLY, I WANTED MY FAMILY TO MEET AND GET TO KNOW THE OTHER FINE ISSEIS AND NISEIS BESIDES MY PARENTS AND UNDERSTAND THEIR GAMBARE SPIRIT WHICH CARRIED THEM THROUGH THE SUFFERING OF THE WAR YEARS AND SHARE IN THE SUCCESSES OF THE NISEI SOLDIERS IN WWII AND IN OVERCOMING PREJUDICE AT HOME WHEN THEY RETURNED.


We had a great turn out for the 2004 Children's

# RICE PAPER letter from National JACL

January 2005

Dear Fellow JACL'er,



The National Japanese American Citizens League greatly appreciates your continued support as a member of this nation's oldest and largest Asian American human and civil rights organization. As you are aware, 2004 was a milestone for the JACL as we celebrated 75 years of fighting for social justice and enriching lives in America. At our national convention in Honolulu, it was truly gratifying to hear speaker after distinguished speaker praise the accomplishments and the rich history of our organization.

Our greatest strength comes from the dedicated support and involvement of each of our JACL members. Each member continues to make a difference as the JACL evolves through thick and thin, ups and downs. One can take pride in the JACL's great historical legacy.

We ask for your personal involvement to pass on this legacy to younger generations, and to family and friends during this membership drive for the New Year. To continue to build our grassroots membership base, we are asking our dedicated members to become JACL Mentors by recruiting <u>one</u> new member.

The work at the JACL is not done and JACL remains relevant today. During this past year, we have continued to promote tolerance and understanding through education.

- Met with Rep. Howard Coble, North Carolina and head of the House Subcommittee on Homeland Security regarding his comment supporting FDR's decision to intern the Japanese Americans, implying that similar action might be warranted relative to Arab Americans. Following this meeting, a letter of regret was issued by Rep. Coble.
- Jap Road, Jap Lane, Jap Rock eliminating derogatory terminology. National JACL testified at the Jefferson County hearing to urge Commissioners to rename "Jap Road" after decades of challenges. Continuing work to change the names of Jap Lane in Orangefield-Vidor, Texas area and Jap Rock, in Palm Beach Co, Florida.
- Strongly criticized Dallas Cowboys coach Bill Parcell for his reference to trick plays as 'Jap plays.' To compound this offensive remark, Parcells prefaced the term with an insensitive disclaimer of "no disrespect to the Orientals,..." JACL offices placed on alert after serious threats received at Headquarters.
- JACL's objection and public challenges to Michelle Malkin for her book "In Defense of Internment: The Case for 'Racial Profiling' in World War II and the War on Terror" which purports to present the "truth" about the historical facts of the internment. It attempts to impugn the loyalty of Japanese Americans during WWII to justify harsher governmental policies today in the treatment of Arab and Muslim Americans.
- JACL signs on to an amicus brief with the NAACP and the Asian American Legal Defense and Education Fund (AALDEF) on the Muslim Community Association of Ann Arbor vs. John Ashcroft case. JACL specifically challenges Section 215 as a threat to membership-based organizations, which could allow government access to its members' information.

The JACL continues to advocate on behalf of Japanese Americans and Asian Americans through such programs as our antihate crimes initiative, which seeks to educate the public about Asian Americans, through our teacher-training workshops with our highly recognized curriculum guide, through our efforts to change public school standards to include Asian American history in all states, and so many other efforts. We also continue to provide over 30 freshmen, undergraduate, and graduate studies scholarships; our Masaoka Congressional Fellowships to help train future Japanese American leaders; and our highly touted JACL Washington DC Leadership Conference.
