#### Ruth Tanbara Honored by the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee

Congratulations to Ruth Nomura Tanbara, who was honored by the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee (SPNSCC) at their Gala Banquet on August 20 in celebration of 50 years of the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister Cities relationship. Tanbara is one of the founding members of the SPNSCC, serving as president from 1966-1972, as a board member for several decades, and as a leader of several delegations to Nagasaki. In 2000, she was awarded the Mondale Award for outstanding contributions to understanding, cooperation and respect between the people of Japan and Minnesota.

Tom Kurihara, Tanbara's nephew and member of the Twin Cities JACL, flew in from Arlington, Virginia, to give her a special tribute at the banquet. He shared a painting that he commissioned to honor Tanbara and her life of public service. The artist, Hiro, was present at the banquet, and distributed an artist statement describing the biographical painting, which is presented as a triptych, in three panels. The first panel depicts Tanbara's early years from her birth as one of the first Japanese Americans born in Oregon (1907) through her education, marriage to Earl Tanbara, early work, and relocation to St. Paul in the summer of 1942 following Executive Order 9066. The second panel is a portrait encircled by vignettes of Tanbara's life, where her work at the St. Paul YWCA is paramount. Highlighted in the third panel is Tanbara's contribution to the SPNSCC and her many other contributions to the community.

Over 200 people attended the banquet held at the Minnesota History Center, including about 40 Japanese from Nagasaki. In her honor, St. Paul Mayor Randy Kelly declared August 20, 2005 as "Ruth Tanbara Day," and staff members presented her with a framed proclamation. A complete article written by Dean Potter on the gala banquet will be published in the Sept. 15, 2005 issue of Asian Pages.

Tanbara will also be recognized as part of the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee, which will be receiving the 2005 Japan-America of Minnesota (JASM) Mondale Award. The presentation will be made at the JASM annual Mondale Award/Scholarship Dinner on Saturday, October 29, 2005, 6-9 p.m. at the William Mitchell College of Law. Tickets are \$100 per person. According to Dulas, the disease affects 12-15 million Americans of which only about 1.25 million are being treated which explains why 150,000 amputations are caused by the disease each year. They then went on to show Dulas in action performing an operation in which he actually "shaves" away plaque in order to remove cholesterol buildup. This procedure speeds recovery time and Dr Dulas hopes that the same techniques in the future can be applied to unblock heart arteries. It was a fascinating segment, but I wish they could have shot more footage of Dan without a mask as it took you awhile to recognize him.

#### Chrysanthemum Banquet to feature Hmong pioneer Sen. Mee Moua

State Sen. Mee Moua, the nation's first Hmong legislator, will be the honored speaker at the JACL Twin Cities' 59th annual Chrysanthemum Banquet Nov. 5.

Sen. Moua, DFL-St. Paul, was the guest speaker at the JACL National Convention in Hawaii last year and a headliner at this year's national convention of the Asian American Journalists Association in Minneapolis last month, where she spoke at the AAJA Town Forum on the media and justice for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders. Moua, 36, has been sought after as a dynamic speaker and pioneer for the Hmong community who is one of a new generation of Asian Americans entering politics.

Since her election to the Minnesota Senate in 2002, she has crisscrossed the nation, lending her voice to numerous events from getting out the vote in other Asian communities to talking about the importance of human rights. Moua, who is married with two children, is a graduate of Brown University with a law degree from the University of Minnesota.

At the banquet, the JACL Twin Cities Board will also honor long-time volunteers Sam Shimada and May Tanaka for their long and unflagging service to the chapter.

The banquet will be held at the recently renamed Marriott Minneapolis West Hotel, formerly known as the Holiday Inn Minneapolis West. It is the same location as last year's banquet and located at 9960 Wayzata Blvd., St. Louis Park. The banquet will begin at 5:00 p.m. with a social hour and silent auction, followed by dinner and the guest speaker.

# Teaching on the high seas

For decades, Bud Nakasone taught history at White Bear Lake Area High School and Century College. Now the longtime White Bear Lake resident teaches at a much more exotic location—aboard Navy ships.

Nakasone started his teaching career at the high school in 1956 and then went on to be a professor at the college for more than 30 years. Only a month after "returing" in 1999, Nakasone was already teaching on a ship in the middle of the ocean. He recently returned from his fifth teaching trip, this time aboard the USS Camden, a combat support ship.

The two-month trips are through Central Texas College's Navy College Program for Afloat College Education, Nakasone said even after he retired he wanted to teach part-time and the Navy program offers an opportunity, to see the world.

He's visited Australia, Hawaii and Mexico, along with many more remote locations including Kuwait,

Djibouti, United Arab Emirates and Bahrain.


When the ship docks, its occupants are often allowed off the ship to visit tourist attractions and participate in service projects. Nakasone

His favorite place to visit was Sasebo, Japan, he said.

The son of Japanese immigrants, Nakasone speaks the language fluently. He has visited the country several times, including teaching for a semester at a Japanese university, but he had never visited Sasebo.

"It was only a quarter mile from the port," he said, "so I got to walk into town and watch the Japanese merchants and ship builders at work. I got to see what daily life is like there and because I know the language I was able to communicate readily with them."

Nakasone said the travel opportunities make living in fairly tight quarters worthwhile. On his last trip, there were more than 600 people aboard the ship, which was only 793 feet long and 107 feet wide. He shared a room that was smaller than most college dorm rooms with another

man, he said. There was just enough space for bunk beds, sink, closet and a pull-down desk.

The ship had a small library, Nakasone said, so that's where he spent most of his time when the ship was at sea and he wasn't teaching.

Although he doesn't mind being cramped, he does miss his family during the two months he's away. He uses email to keep up-to-date on what he's missing at home, he

But teaching is his life, he said, and this allows him to continue doing so, for a few months out of the year, now that he is retired.

"Tm glad f'm able to help Uncle Sam's sailors out by teaching them history and able to help them get a start on college." he said Teaching is my forte and I hope to continue as long as I'm still in good health."


