





We learned so much from the people that lived through the events. Our history books leave out so much. Thank you for the curriculum guide. The students were eager to learn how Minnesota was involved in the war effort."


Sylvia Farrells manning the Twin Cities JACL Education Committee booth at the MCSS Spring Conference in March.





### javm memorial service


nese American Veterans of Minnesota Memorial Service

Over forty people attended the Japanese American Veterans of Minnesota (JAVM) annual memorial service at Fort Snelling National Cemetery on May 19. JAVM president Edwin (Bud) Nakasone gave introductory remarks, followed by an invocation by Chaplain Robert Burmeister.

Keynote speaker Yo Matsumoto talked about the Nisei Student Relocation Commemorative (NSRC) Fund, and the role that the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council (NJASRC) played in assisting college-aged Nisei to leave the internment camps to continue their studies. During World War II, the assistance of the NJASRC enabled Matsumoto to leave camp to attend Washington University in St. Louis. Last year, a local volunteer committee chaired by Judy Murakami and Janet Maeda Carlson awarded \$49,000 in scholarships to high school graduates of Southeast Asian descent through the NSRC Fund. Included in the scholarships was a memorial scholarship named for Matsumoto's wife, Alice Abe Matsumoto, who was also one of the nearly 5,000 Nisei who benefitted from the work of the NJASRC.

After a moment of silence, the honor roll call of fifty-four veterans was read by Mary Tsuchiya and John Takekawa. Chaplain Burmeister ended the program with a benediction, and gravesites of the veterans were each decorated with flowers. A luncheon at the New Century Buffet in Bloomington followed the service.

Thank you to Bud Nakasone for continuing to lead the JAVM group, Sam Honda for annually doing the job magnificently in honoring our Japanese American veterans, Isamu (Sam) Saito for his assistance with the service, and Kathy Ohama Koch for r ing together the mailing and handout.

An attorney and civil rights activist who:

- Challenged the constitutionality of the curfew orders that were imposed against Japanese Americans before their internment
- Never wavered in his pursuit of social justice for all Americans
- Served as the Executive Director of the Commission on Human Relations for the City and County of Denver
- During the 1980s, chaired and served as an articulate spokesman for JACL's successful campaign to obtain redress for the
  injustice of the World War II incarceration.

Joyce Yamamoto, long-time leader of YWCA's Racial Justice and Public Policy Department, is retiring after 17 years of successful leadership at the YWCA and in the community. Her official retirement date is June 1, 2008. The YWCA has become a stronger, inclusive organization thanks to her leadership, vision and commitment to the YWCA's mission.

During her years at the YWCA, she has been a fearless champion for the YWCA. She led the successful expansion of Girls and Youth program through the creation of Asian Youth, Discovery Leadership and the Girls R.A.P. programs. She was also instrumental in the creation of the Women's Wellness program and helped to lead the programs' successful transition to the Health and Fitness department.

In 2002, Joyce led the creation of the YWCA of Minneapolis Racial Justice Department, (now know as the Racial Justice and Public Policy Department) which includes:

- It's Time to Talk Forums on Race Event, which draws over 1100 diverse leaders annually
- · Unlearning Racism workshops
- · YWCA staff Dialogues on Race
- Circle Process and Circle Facilitator Training
- · Board Development Dialogues

In 2005, thanks to Joyce's leadership, the YWCA of Minneapolis was the recipient of the Minnesota Council on Nonprofits' Anti-Racism Award.

Many have asked what compels her to engage in Racial Justice and Public Policy work. Her response is, "My life's purpose is to do my part in creating a legacy of positive change that welcomes my great grandchildren and your great grandchildren to participate wholeheartedly in and environment of racial justice and inclusion. I want them to know their grandmother did SOMETHING to eliminate racism and shift the paradigm to valuing their diverse perspectives and honoring their cultural heritage."

While Joyce 's official retirement date is June 1, 2008, she will lead the 6th *Annual It's Time to Talk* event scheduled for November 12, 2008. She will also continue to do training workshops, Circle and Dialogue facilitation.

#### Finding Art After Life-Changing Accident

Reporting <u>James Schugel</u> (WCCO) - Some special artists are proving life does go on after a traumatic accident. These artists from around the world are in Minnesota to show off their talents at an art show.



in the middle of her kitchen, Susan Fink found her new love of art. It's far from the kindergarten classroom she used to teach in and far from the slopes she used to ski. "I'm painting flowers," she said.

Fink has painted all sorts of scenes, mostly outdoor ones that represent her connection with nature. Her inspiration comes from years of skiing, downhill and cross-country, and memories of long vacations in the mountains. "The fresh snow, and I just liked the feeling of it, and we could do it as a family," she recalled.

Her life of skiing abruptly ended nearly 10 years ago during a terrible fall when she was going down a hill. It changed everything. "Just fell wrong. It was a fluke," recalled Fink. "I fell on my face. My hands just didn't catch me."

Fink broke her neck and suffered a spinal cord injury, spending months in the hospital and in rehabilitation. She's now a quadriplegic and confined mostly to a wheelchair. She is free to use her arms, her hands and her memories of her trips to create watercolor paintings. "It helps me connect with nature, because I'm still able to connect with nature, I just can't be out in it as much," said Fink.

Her art will be part of a collection of 300 works of art at an International Art Show the next several weeks. The show is at the Sister Kenny Institute of Abbott Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis. It's free and it runs through May 16, from 9 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. during regular business hours.

Fink wants people to think of peacefulness when they see her work, which is exactly how she feels when she's painting.

"It's my way to enjoy the outdoors," she said.

Original story on KARE-11 February 14 - Referee returns to court to thank rescuers

Dale Wakasugi, the referee who suffered a heart attack in December, returned to the school where it happened and thanked those that helped him. Wakasugi was able to thank his rescuers at Fridley High School Tuesday night during half time of their game against Totino-Grace.



He suffered a heart attack on December 13th. Several spectators rushed to his side and revived him. Wakasugi did also referee the game Tuesday night.

For basketball referee Dale Wakasugi, it wasn't a question of if, but when he'd return to the court. The 'when' was the week of February 4th, less than two months after suffering a near-fatal heart incident while officiating a game at Fridley High School. "They keep telling me 'the heart's a muscle,' the more you work it the stronger it gets," Wakasugi laughed, "so that's sort of what's motivated me to get back out there."

While he's resuming routine, there is no doubt Wakasugi's life is forever changed. He knows he is fortunate to be alive, and credits 16-year- old Lindsey Paradise for that fact. She was in the bleachers December 13th, ran down when Dale collapsed, and then used an Automatic External Defibrillator to restart his non-beating heart.

"I'm convinced, without a doubt, that God put her in the stands that night," he said.

In the days after their lives collided, Dale and Lindsey's family began talking on the phone and getting to know each other. Eventually, they decided to have dinner at the Wakasugis, not knowing how they'd handle the uncertainty and emotion of the event. "When we went over there, I was so nervous walking up to the door, just 'sooo' nervous, my heart was pounding," recalled Lindsey. "Then when they opened the door, they said 'trick or treat,' they just made jokes. You walked in, they immediately felt like family."

The two families found they had much in common, and the bond between Dale and Lindsey sits front and center. "We literally felt like family with them, everyone was hugging, laughing, crying when they left," Dale reflected. "It was quite emotional."

MT: How do you and your brother get along? Kristi: He's my twin, and he'll be student teaching next fall. We went to high school and college (Minnesota State University, Mankato) together. But it was great because my brother and I are best friends. It's awesome. I think there was only one year that we had growing up that we butted heads, in ninth grade. He's absolutely amazing.

MT: OK, let's change subjects. Can you cook? Kristi: I love watching the Food Network, but I live at home, so my mom cooks every night. Still, I'm in love with all kitchen supplies and can't wait to have my own kitchen some day. But between going to school and dancing, I come home and I'm too tired to cook. It's so nice though, because my mom will leave a plate with saran rap and my name on it. She's a teacher, so you know...
